With the end of year approaching, our lives get busier planning for holidays and celebrations. Please be mindful to take some time to focus on slowing down while out and about on the roads.



U-turns in School Zones

Maximum penalty in a School Zone: \$457 + 4 demerit points

remember, road safety starts with you.


Performing a U-turn, or a three-point-turn, in a school zone can be dangerous and is strongly discouraged. Instead, find an alternative route. There is no amount of time-saving that warrants the serious risk these manoeuvres pose to children and other pedestrians and road users.



Remember! Road safety starts with you. Take responsibility for your actions.

Drivers are not allowed to make a U-turn:

- at an intersection without traffic lights where a 'no U-turn' sign is displayed,
- at a break in a driving strip where a 'no U-turn' sign is displayed,
- · across any of the following:



1. a single continuous dividing line.



2. a single continuous dividing line to the left of a broken line.



3. two parallel continous dividing lines.





Walking together to and from school

A message from NSW Department of Education - road safety education

Walking to and from school with your child helps to promote physical activity, ease traffic congestion, reduce your carbon footprint, and provide time to talk about being a safe pedestrian.

Always demonstrate correct pedestrian behaviour.

The best way you can help your child to be a safe pedestrian is to:

- 1. give them lots of supervised practice with you or another trusted adult
- 2. talk with and teach your child about being alert in the road environment
- 3. always hold your child's hand until at least 8 years old
- 4. explain why the place you have chosen is the safest place to cross the road
- 5. point out dangers, such as vehicles coming out of driveways
- 6. use pedestrian crossings and traffic lights correctly
- 7. teach your child to keep turning their head in both directions to look and listen for traffic as they cross the road
- 8. talk with them about everything they need to think about to keep safe when walking
- 9. explain why they should look and listen before crossing a driveway, road or carpark
- 10.talk with your child and reinforce Stop! Look! Listen! Think! every time you cross the road together.
