What do we study in Year 9

- •Personal Finance—students develop budgets, learn the pro's and con's of taking a loan and where to obtain financial information.
- •Promoting and selling-students develop their own product, make the product and then promote the product, learning important promoting and selling techniques along the way.
- •Running a Business—in groups, students plan and run their own business at school using the theory they learn in class.
- •Travel—enables students to prepare well for any overseas travel they intend to do in the future.
